Notes from RevCathy and RevHeather

A note from Rev. Cathy: Winter, Travel, Beloved Conversations, [TRUUst](#), and more!

I hope that everyone stayed warm and safe over this weekend's storm and bitter cold! We were so grateful that the storm did not impact the kick-off retreat of *Beloved Conversations: Meditations on Race and Ethnicity*. Friday evening and all day Saturday, 25 of us from USH were joined by another 25 from the Universalist Church of West Hartford and the Unitarian Society of New Haven in a rich, open, deep-dive into culture, white supremacy, relationships, assumptions, and racial justice led by facilitator Rev. Kierstin Homblette Allen. We will now begin 8 sessions of going deeper—I will be co-facilitating one group with Gloria Mengual, and Rick Tsukada & Laurie Kelliher will facilitate our other group. Stay tuned for more! (And yes, we plan to do this program again next year for all of you who are on the waitlist or would like to do it).

On Sunday the 13th, I referenced a General Assembly sermon by Rev. Nancy McDonald Ladd—I encourage you to [watch or read it here](#), and you can [read my sermon here](#). Many of you have shared with me your disappointment that we had to cancel Khaiim the RapOet as our pulpit guest this past Sunday—rest assured that we are working on rescheduling him! In the meantime, let us know if you live-streamed another worship service while iced-in this past Sunday. We'd love to hear about any ways you nourished your spirit!

Tomorrow, I head to Tucson, Arizona for the second intensive in a professional development program called "Beyond the Call: Grounding and Growing Our Prophetic Ministries." In addition to soaking up some warmth and sun, I look forward to engaging deeply—spiritually, intellectually, and strategically—with colleagues on the theme of "Resistance." I have co-organized an additional day and a half of immigration solidarity work for a dozen of us—we will be witnessing criminal court proceedings, canvassing neighbors, and perhaps visiting the wall at the border itself. I will surely come back with my heart and mind full of things to share with you about immigration and organizing. I will return on Tuesday, January 29th.

I'm excited to share that [TRUUsT](#), the organization of trans, non-binary, and genderqueer UU professionals, has just published a report. As TRUUsT says, the report "provides an unprecedented look at the the experiences of trans Unitarian Universalists, based on a survey of hundreds of trans UU conducted in spring 2018 by TRUUsT and the Unitarian Universalist Association's Multicultural Ministries office. The report provides a portrait of who trans UU are, shares trends in their experiences of inclusion and marginalization in UU congregations, gives a snapshot of the particular experiences of trans religious professionals, and offers actions that all Unitarian Universalists can take to improve the experiences of trans people within Unitarian Universalism. News from the USH Board of Directors

FY2019 USH Board Priorities

My New Year's resolution is to communicate more, so belatedly, below are the FY2019 Board priorities developed at the June Board retreat and subsequent board meetings. These objectives guide the Board's work.

Objective A: Leadership development/capacity building

This is an ongoing process of engaging members in the life of the congregation and building capacity for the good work that we do together. It also recognizes that many members would like to be involved, but in discrete activities where they have an interest vs.

signing up for committees for a longer term. A few specific aspects of this effort:

- The Nominating Committee is in process of evaluating candidates for FY2020 open Board and various committee positions. The Nominating Committee itself could use more members.
- Council Chairs work with Sub-councils to engage members. The upcoming Council Fair on January 27th, after service, is a great opportunity to learn more.
- The Membership Sub-council is reevaluating its structure and how best to engage more members in welcoming newcomers and in the healthy growth of the congregation.

Objective B: Anti-racism

The focus this year is primarily on changing internal congregational culture and attitudes with respect to race through discussions and educational programming. These and/or other efforts will continue in future years:

- Race Matters discussions on Sundays after services during the first six months of the fiscal year.
- The Beloved Conversations class will first be offered January 18 and 19th with eight 2-hour sessions thereafter. The class is full for this year but will be offered again.

Objective C: Sustainable Financial Model

This is an ongoing effort to assure we have the funds necessary to operate effectively in the short-term and that we are assuring the long-term financial viability of USH. We continue to improve on the financial framework and put in place mechanisms for sound financial management. The focus is on budgeting, revenue growth and diversification, and building staff capacity. We will begin planning for a capital campaign (which will consider financial needs in addition to those related to the building) and a legacy giving campaign.

Objective D: Adult Religious Education

During FY2019, we will better define and address Adult Religious Education needs. We have initiated a search for an intern minister to start January 2020 with a focus on Adult RE. We have also begun to look at life cycle curriculums used by other UU congregations such as "Faith Forward" <https://faithforwarduu.org/about/>

Objective E: Congregational Covenant—Right Relations

This involves two initiatives in FY2019:

- A Co-Minister evaluation process established
- Safer Congregation policy and implementation team formalized

As a reminder, the Semi-annual Congregational meeting will be Sunday February 24th immediately following the service. Please plan to attend to learn more or contact a Board member, Co-Minister, or Council or Sub-Council chairs. —Submitted by Sherry Manetta, USH Board President

I value democracy. *With respect and collaboration, we create a government for the people, by the people.*

Action 1: Speak up for a healthy, respectful democracy. [h/t [United We Dream Austin](#), [Make the Road](#), [BAJI](#)]

Part 1—Call: Your two senators ([look up](#)).

Script: Hi. I'm from [ZIP]. The president's [border proposal](#) pits Americans and government workers against our immigrant neighbors. I am asking [NAME] to publicly reject his proposal and support three specific things:

1. to end the government shutdown that is [hurting so many Americans](#).
2. to [refuse even a single dollar](#) to the president's wall or [a militarized border](#).
3. to create [permanent solutions](#) for DACA and TPS. Thank you.

Part 2—Call: Sen. Mitch McConnell. DC number: 202-224-2541 (We don't call other people's senators, but McConnell represents all Americans in his role as Senate Majority Leader.)

Script: As Senate Majority Leader, Mitch McConnell represents me. I am asking him to reject the president's border proposal. Instead,

bring to the floor bipartisan government funding bills passed in the House that support three specific things:

1. an end the government shutdown that is [hurting so many Americans](#).
2. [not a single dollar](#) to the president's wall or a [militarized border](#).
3. the creation of [permanent solutions](#) for DACA and TPS. Thank you.

□ Action 2: Be proactively kind.

It's already been a tough couple of years for government employees. If you encounter people working through the shutdown, be extra gracious—particularly TSA agents who already have a tough enough job to do. Reach out to the federal employees and contractors in your life. Buy them a coffee and listen to how they are doing. Ask if there's anything that they need. Especially, take a moment to express gratitude for the work they do. A kind word about the value of government service could be just the boost they need to persevere...to read more click [HERE](#).

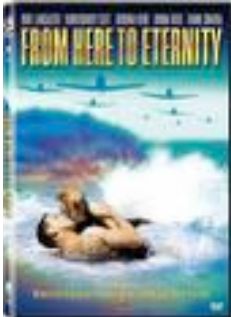

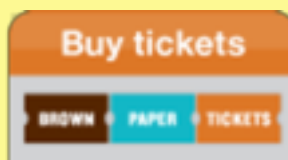
