THE CONVERSATION PROJECT Sunday, Oct 27 - 12:15 PM, Chapel

The USH Caring Network is sponsoring a free one-hour program called "The Conversation Project" at 12:15 on Sunday, Oct. 27, in the Chapel.

"The Conversation Project" is a national educational workshop dedicated to helping people talk about potential health care and end of life decisions. How can you give your loved ones the confidence they need to make important medical decisions in the event you're unable to make them for yourself? There will be strategies and tips on how to begin these difficult conversations with loved ones. While 92% of Americans say it's important to discuss their wishes for end-of-life care, only 32% have had such a conversation. 95% of Americans say they would be willing to talk about their wishes, and 53% even say they'd be relieved to discuss it (The Conversation Project National Survey, 2018).

The facilitator is Peggy Coburn, MPH, Administrator at McLean Home Care and Hospice, with 20 years of experience in the senior health care industry.

No reservations are needed, but you may want to bring a lunch from home to eat during coffee hour before the program.

Undoing Racism ® is our signature workshop. Through dialogue, reflection, role-playing, strategic planning and presentations, this intensive process challenges participants to analyze the structures of power and privilege that hinder social equity and prepares them to be effective organizers for justice. The multiracial team of organizers/trainers includes more than 100 men and women whose anti-racist

organizing expertise includes years with civil, labor and welfare rights struggles, educational, foster care, social service and health reform movements, as well as youth and grassroots community organizing. An average of 30 groups per month participate in The People's Institute Undoing Racism®/Community Organizing process.

Workshop participants will:

Develop a common definition of racism and an understanding of its different forms: individual, institutional, linguistic, and cultural;

Develop a common language and analysis for examining racism in the United States;

Understand one's own connection to institutional racism and its impact on his/her work;

Understand why people are poor and the role of institutions in exacerbating institutional racism, particularly for people and communities of color;

Understand the historical context for how racial classifications in the United States came to be and how and why they are maintained;

Understand the historical context for how U.S. institutions came to be and who they have been designed to serve; Understand how all of us, including white people, are adversely impacted by racism every day, everywhere; Address surface assumptions about how your work is (or is not) affected by racism;

travel in MA, ME, and VT, performing in colorful traditional costumes, as well as offering dance workshops. The group includes 17 dancers and musicians, 15 youth and two adults and are accompanied by the youth folk dance band "Lelkes Zenekar."

These events will be engaging for all ages! The dances feature an exuberant display of intricate moves and patterns that invite participation. The live music is infectious and leaves the audience wanting to hear more.
