


An Illustrated Tale of Our Sanctuary Roof by David Newton, B&G

Much of the history of our remarkable Meeting House is interwoven with the history of the now infamous Sanctuary Roof. Come with me for an entertaining journey of discovery and improvements to our shared Meeting House home since about 1964.

After attending Unitarian churches and fellowships elsewhere, Janice and I joined the Unitarian Society of Hartford in the 1990s during the ministry of Jon Luopa. Not long thereafter, I joined the Building and Grounds Sub-Council, soon becoming Secretary Pro Tem of the group, something which continues into 2022!

Early on it was apparent something was unique about the Sanctuary roof, as whenever it rained, we needed to fetch out buckets that were placed strategically among the pews. Some individual pews were delaminating from becoming wet so frequently.

Here, above, is a photo of the roof, circa 2005. If you look carefully, you will see a lake on the left side.

The story I was told went something like this:

When Victor Lundy designed the Meeting House, his vision was of the vaulted ceiling we now enjoy in the Sanctuary. The method of creating the vaulted space was by suspending the entire structure, with cables emanating from individual buttresses rising above sloping peripheral roof segments. Incidentally, these buttresses are of different height — thus symbolizing separate paths to truth as visioned by Unitarians on their spiritual journeys.

The cables supported a kind of inverted tent or bowl shape. As rain fell on the inverted "bowl", it flowed toward four peripheral drains. In keeping with the aesthetics, these four roof drains conducted water inside the buttresses, thereby avoiding pipes and other plumbing items in view. The internal pipes emerged above the roof line about halfway down the sweeping lower roofs. No one realized at the time exiting water would first pass into the buttress surrounded by warm sanctuary air only to exit above the roof line in freezing conditions. More about that later.

Remember the inverted bowl shape.

As soon as the building was populated in its mostly finished status, the roof began to leak.

Magic and Myth: Music from the Old World and the New Seán Heely duo with bouzouki player Beth Patterson Friday May 13, 2022

Experience the magic music of Scotland and Ireland with Seán Heely and Beth Patterson. Along with his accolades in Traditional Music, Seán made his Classical solo debut with the Virginia Symphony in 2012 performing Mozart's 5th Violin Concerto. A composer and arranger, Seán has won national awards including the 2016 Scottish Fiddling Revival's Tune writing competition. Seán was a featured soloist with the Virginia International Tattoo in Norfolk, VA in April 2017 and 2019. Recently, Sean was named the recipient of the first annual Claude Martin Memorial Life Membership Award from the Folklore Society of Greater Washington, an honor granted in recognition of his significant contributions to the local folk scene while still under age 30.

U.S National Scottish Fiddle champion Seán Heely and bouzouki player Beth Patterson perform fiery dance tunes and ancient, soaring melodies from Scotland and Ireland. Original compositions abound and they have rich vocal harmonies in their solid song repertoire that features ballads, sea shanties, and songs in Irish and Scottish folk tradition. Seán plays fiddle, mandocello, shruti box, and sings in English, Irish, and Scots Gaelic.

Multi-Genre violinist/fiddler Seán Heely is one of the most creatively versatile and captivating young artists of his generation. He is a <u>U.S National Scottish</u> <u>Fiddle Champion</u> as well as an award-winning Irish Fiddler and singer in the folk traditions of Scotland and Ireland. Seán holds a degree from University of South Carolina in Classical Violin Performance and was a 2019 <u>Artist in Residence at</u> <u>Strathmore Music Center</u> in Maryland. An educator in demand, Seán is an <u>Adjunct</u> <u>Instructor at American University</u>, he has also been on the faculty at several summer camps such as <u>Acadia Traditional School of Music and Arts</u>, <u>Upper</u> <u>Potomac Fiddle Retreat</u>, and <u>Fiddle Hell Festival</u>. He was selected to compete in the prestigious Fleadh Cheoil na hÉireann All-Ireland Senior Fiddle competition in Aug 2017. He has performed in Scotland, Ireland, and at venues in the U.S such as the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C.

Seán has performed with traditional music icons such as Liz Carroll, Bonnie Rideout, Natalie Haas, Cathy Jordan, Eamon O'Leary, Zan McLeod, and Paddy Keenan.
