Kate Byroade, Pulpit Guest

This Sunday we welcome Kate Byroade to our pulpit.

Kate has several connections to USH. She is the sister of Miriam Byroade and Sarah Krippenstapel, a friend of Sarah McKenzie, and a colleague of Laurel Goodgion, who has been an invaluable mentor for many years. Kate is a member of Trinity Episcopal Church in Hartford where she is one of a number of supplemental preachers and a lay leader. She earned a bachelor's degree in Religion and a master's degree in Library & Information Science and has taken classes at the Hartford Seminary. She is a past president of the Connecticut Library Association.

Kate Byroade's sermon is in the spirit of our summer theme "Living Fully" and the phrase's relationship to her commitment as the Library Director at Cragin Memorial Library in Colchester CT. The library has been in recent news articles about the Colchester First Selectman who responded to a parent's complaint about the book "Who is RuPaul?" by requesting its removal from the children's section of the library. The 4th principle of the Unitarian Universalist faith is a commitment to the "free and responsible search for truth and meaning". Kate's actions and response to the council member highlight her position as a First Amendment champion for free speech and protection from censorship. Kate's position resonates broadly with our UU principles.

Kate shares, "USH's summer theme of "living fully" reminded me of my college's motto "Vita Abundantior" or "The Life More Abundant" which comes from the Gospel of John. I will talk about how that phrase has informed my personal and professional choices. I will definitely be talking about the events of the past week at work, of facing the single greatest challenge of my career, but more broadly about what it means to commit to a profession that may seem boring, irrelevant, or outdated to outsiders but is vital to the flourishing of our society."

Laurie is a lifelong Unitarian, proud of her third generation UU children. She is a self-described proselytizer for the UU faith and views being a Worship Associate as one more avenue to spread the word.

From the Board

Thank you for your comments to us, about qualities you believe important in a minister. When a congregation goes looking for a new minister, it's necessary to gather as much information on what that congregation would consider to be a "good fit" as possible. Usually, when searching for a settled minister, there are multiple meetings with various groups within the congregation, numerous surveys sent out, and invitations to contribute thoughts in person. This time, as we're operating outside the typical process, things are a bit different. The board takes on the tasks generally assigned to a search committee. The time allotted is compressed, and the pool of available "candidates" is small. This does not translate to pessimism, or to the improbability of finding a good match, but it does mean there are things we are, and need to be, doing differently this time around.

One of those things is tuning in to you... normally, in a series of "cottage meetings" we would be asking small groups, "what is most important to you?" in a variety of ways. This time, we did that in our newsletter and crossed our fingers. Thankfully, there were enough responses to give the sense that our aim is in general alignment with your expressed desire and concern. Thank you for this invaluable assistance.

Right now, we are still in the process of negotiating for a minister next year. We have met twice, virtually, with one who appears promising. References have been received and contacted, and these have been helpful. We hope to have more definite information next week, after the July 12 board meeting.

In other matters, we are halfway through the calendar year, and just entering a new "church" year. The Board of Directors effected a peaceful transfer of power on July 1: new board members have assumed their positions, and some existing members continue service in different capacities. At the bottom of this newsletter you can see the current board roster listed. We give great thanks to Rob Spector, departing President, for his service in what can accurately be termed a challenging year, and Bob Hewey, departing Treasurer, for keeping our books straight. Similarly, we welcome Eve Pech as President and Dana Donovan as President-Elect, Jon Covault in his new role as Treasurer, and new council chairs Judy Sullivan (Social

Justice) and Paul Cipriano (Administration). Last, congratulations and thanks to the Worship Associates for the successful first summer service and for all their work to keeping us afloat spiritually.

Warning about Phishing emails

We have received notices from several congregation members that spammers are sending along solicitations to congregational members supposedly from a staff member using an incorrect address requesting gift cards. The sending address is not valid and you should know the matter is a scam.



Please delete accordingly. We show, below, an example of this particular scam, though there are various similar versions. You will **never** be asked to give gift cards or such items by email. If you have any questions please check with Buffie Pinney, David Newton, or Tina Davies.

This is how the latest scam begins:

"Hi, I've been working on incentives for some of our diligent staff but I've been very busy with Church duties and i aimed at surprising some of them with gift cards. I believe you're the best person to do this for me discreetly.

The email goes on to caution about a 'surprise' element and maintaining confidentiality. A solicitation for money for gift cards is implied. The anonymous writer appeals to the reader's vanity: "I believe you're the best person to do this for me discreetly."

Since 2013 The Unitarian Society of Hartford has contributed to the school Uniform Fundraiser at The Village for Families and Children. The Village, whose main campus is our next door neighbor, is a social service agency that has been serving families and children in Greater Hartford for over 200 years.

It feels like school just ended, or perhaps never happened last year. For families in underserved communities the reality of the next school year, especially the need to buy school supplies including school specific uniforms, is all too real.

The Uniform Fundraiser helps 600 families buy uniforms for their children. Each uniform, one top and one bottom costs approximately \$30.

USH is participating in the Uniform Fundraiser again this summer. The Fundraiser ends on August 19. Please donate as you are able. Any amount is welcome.
