Congregational Matters

Let There Be Light!



Spoken by Jim Venneman, Dedicating New Sanctuary Lights

"Today begins not only a new church year, but also the dedication of these new lights in the USH Sanctuary. I will now give a brief history of

lighting in the sanctuary and why Ellie and I chose to help make these new lights possible.

In Genesis 1, verse 3 we learn "God said, Let there be light: and there was light." While God may have been able to install lighting that lit up the whole world in one day, it has taken USH many decades to do the same for this sanctuary.

David Newton will demonstrate the new lights. The two lights in front of the chancel are controlled separately from the eight over the pews. Also, the up, side, and down lights operate separately or together, as desired. Each component can also be individually dimmed or brightened through switches on the chancel and by the entrance that turn on and off set arrangements, as is being demonstrated now.

Per Robert Chapman's summary on the USH website, Victor Lundy wanted the sanctuary to be lit indirectly by the clerestory windows around the center roof. He also envisioned a series of thin "eyebrow" skylights through the roof, with hidden light sources. Fortunately, they realized the building would cost more than originally expected, so these skylights were dropped from the final plans. Over time, they would have caused many leaks, with water coming through the roof everywhere.

This Sanctuary was dedicated on December 6, 1964. With no lights in the ceiling and it being December, it probably was pretty dark inside. The only light was from the clerestory windows, which of course did not help at night; plus any light that came from the lights in the outer ambulatory. And, since the ceiling is wood, far less light was reflected than would have been, had the ceiling been painted white. Per long-time members Marilyn Stockton, Louise Schmoll and Peter Meny, this sanctuary was dark for over twenty years.

When Jon Luopa came in 1986, he insisted there be an overhead light. Roy Cook came up with our "hockey puck." It helped, but much of the light it generates is wasted, both because light reflects poorly from the dark wood slats and much light is lost through the dark spaces between those slats. Roy used a 1,000 watt bulb designed for outdoor use, which explains the color it emits. The ten new lights are LEDs. The maximum energy draw from all ten (if none are dimmed) is equivalent to 1,060

watts. Since some components will usually be dimmed, USH will get more usable light while using less electricity most of the time. Using less energy to light this sanctuary is consistent with the aim of our seventh principle, which calls for respecting "the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part."

Since there is no longer a need for the puck light, I will turn it off. You now see the natural color and tone of the woodwork for the first time.

About 10 years ago the "wash lights" were placed on the wall around the sanctuary. These do a wonderful job of lighting the banners and the walkway, but they were never intended to illuminate the central area.

Now to the present. When our son died, Ellie and I wanted to do something to honor the joy he brought to us. In May 2017, I asked Hugh Schweitzer if he thought it possible to get new lights in this sanctuary. He said yes, and he generously offered his architectural expertise and connections. From 2017 until this summer there were numerous hold ups, delays, and frustrations not to mention the novel task of putting lights in our spectacular and unique Sanctuary ceiling.

While God may have been able to light the whole world in one day, we are mere mortals. Today we dedicate these lights — 21,098 days since this Sanctuary was first dedicated in 1964.

I will end by saying that "As our son, David, brightened our world from 1985 to 2017, these Sanctuary lights will brighten USH for years to come."

Really Good News: NO LEAKS!

On September 6, 2022, we had continuous rain. According to the rain gauge at the MeetingHouse, we received at least 4 inches.

Aficionados of the Meeting House, book storage folks and many others who use Classroom A for storage of things know puddles in the back of the room creep out from the corners after every rain; they have been doing so since any of us can remember. Many of us have engaged with the wet vac, collecting gallons of water leaking in after every rain and requiring

various blocks to elevate stored items above the periodic floods.

Earlier this summer we dug up the drain under the overhang for the Classroom A Bay and rearranged all the piping with what might be called the pol ethylene sheeting installation of drainage piping.

After this considerable labor, we awaited a test of the new installation. An inch of rain was the established criterion to see if the efforts were successful. Nature promptly parched the state of Connecticut until Labor Day; thus the delay in seeing any results.

It worked! Thanks to the installation crew digging, moving gravel, reinstalling pipe, connecting to the old tile drain for the area and all the rest of it. They are Kevin Giouard, Bill Simmons, Ron Sexton, and David Newton.

Our Good Neighbor Offering (GNO) for September will go to CIRI — Connecticut Institute for Refugees and Immigrants. CIRI provides a compassionate array of high-quality legal, social, and

educational programming for refugees, immigrants, and survivors of human trafficking and torture. Operating since 1918, CIRI has assisted refugees and immigrants in becoming self-sufficient, integrated, and contributing members of their communities.

CIRI is a statewide leader and collaborator in delivering services and training, with offices in Hartford, Bridgeport, Stamford, and Waterbury.

Included among CIRI's many current programs are:

- ° Resettlement for Ukrainian refugees (one of CT's three primary resettlement agencies)
- ° A Rental Assistance Program for undocumented immigrants and others not eligible for federal assistance during the Covid-19 pandemic (operated with the CT Department of Housing)
- ° A comprehensive workforce readiness and employment support program.

* Our October selection: Tasha, A Son's Memoir Tasha Morton is a force of nature: a brilliant educator who's left her mark on generations of students — and also a whirlwind of a mother, intrusive, chaotic, oppressively devoted, and irrepressible.

For decades, her son Brian has kept her at a self-protective distance, but when her health begins to fail, he knows it's time to assume responsibility for her care. Even so, he's not prepared for what awaits him, as her refusal to accept her own fragility leads to a series of epic outbursts and altercations that are sometimes frightening, sometimes wildly comic, and sometimes both.

Clear-eyed, "deeply stirring" (Dani Shapiro, The New York Times Book Review), and brimming with dark humor, Tasha is both a vivid account of an unforgettable woman and a stark look at the impossible task of caring for an elderly parent in a country whose unofficial motto is "you're on your own."
