March Good Neighbor Offering:

The Village for Families and Children was one of the first agencies to provide care for neglected children. What began over 200 years ago as The female Beneficent Society to help children, grew over many iterations to become The Village for Families and Children in 1993. The mission of The Village is "to build a community of strong healthy families to support and nurture children." The 500 professional staff at The Village for Families and Children include child psychologists, clinicians, nurses, social workers, psychiatrists, teachers and parent educators. They provide outpatient and inpatient care, in school, in home, and in the community. The Village works in collaboration with local and state agencies and relies on supporters and donors.

In response to growing needs, The Village now has three campuses. The main, original campus is on Albany Avenue, next to USH. There are two other campuses in Hartford, on Wethersfield Avenue and Spring Street. Programming has also changed to include more resources for adults.

The Village for Families and Children has adapted to the increasing need for mental health services in a complex world.

- Grains: Pasta, one-pound bags of rice, cereal
- Comfort foods: Macaroni and cheese, chicken noodle soup

USH Collaborates with Universalist Church Backpack Program

Three members of USH's Social Justice Ministry are volunteering at the Fern Street Backpack program which provides weekend meals to 14 West Hartford schools, each having foodinsecure families with 118 students being served.

Judy Sullivan, Louise Harmon, and Diana Heymann are currently trained to pack bags for families with special needs/dietary restrictions.

We are also filling in when there is a need to deliver these weekend bags to schools.

Each family's bag contains food items of the following: Protein, Starch, Vegetable Breakfast items, Snacks, and Drinks.

Take a look at the list below for items in need:

Peanut Butter, Canned/Dry Beans, Green
Peas, Oatmeal, Pasta, Rice, Crackers, Chips, Other
Grains, Cereal/Granola, Granola Bars, Dry/Can Fruit, Dry/Can Soup, Pasta
Sauce, Can Tomatoes, Can Vegetables, Dry Potatoes, Fruit Juice, Fruit
Cups, Applesauce, Oatmeal Packets, Bars, Cereal Cups, Nuts/Trail Mix
Non-Food Items: Toilet Paper, Paper
