



General Assembly: 2023 "Faithfully Becoming"

This year's General Assembly (GA) will be held June 21 through 25, in Pittsburgh. Attendees will be able to participate either online or in person As stated on the UUA's website, "The General

Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association is the annual gathering of UUs where we conduct the business of the Association, explore the theological underpinnings of our faith, and lean into our mission and principles."

Registration has now opened with a variety of rates posted through May 15, when some of the rate categories will increase. Access <u>uua.org</u>, click on "menu", and select "General Assembly" for the details.

Note: while anyone can register for, and attend, GA, only credentialed delegates nominated by their congtrgations are eligible to "conduct the business of the Association", including voting. In 2023, this business includes potentially advancing controversial changes in the UUA's bylaws (see Judy Robbins' piece, below). USH, with 136 certified members, is eligible to be represented by **three** credentialed delegates. USH members interested in attending GA **as an official, voting representative of our congregation** should email the board (which will be recommending its slate of delegates to the UUA), at ushboardofdirectors@gmail.com, with the notation "GA" in the subject line. The board will then select three delegates and one alternate delegate as our representatives.

Important UUA Bylaws Revision —

The Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) is proposing to change both the mission of the UUA and the purpose of our churches. These changes will affect all UU churches and Hartford is no exception. The linked article here is by Anne Scheneider, Ph.D, a retired professor from Arizona State University and long-time UU. Anne gives both sides – the viewpoint of those who support the changes and those who oppose them. It's a good place to start. If you want to dig deeper, go here or to the UUA website here.

The proposed revisions will make major changes to our Principles and Sources. Unitarian Universalism does not have a theology like mainstream religions, but we all honor the moral and ethical code outlined in our Principles and Sources (see below).

Unitarian Universalist Principles -

There are seven Principles which Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote:

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person
- Justice, equity and compassion in human relations
- · Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

Unitarian Universalist Sources -

Unitarian Universalism draws from many Sources:

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit
- Spiritual teachings of earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

The Village for Families and Children in 1993. The mission of The Village is "to build a community of strong healthy families to support and nurture children." The Village works in collaboration with local and state agencies and relies on supporters and donors. In response to growing needs, The Village now has three campuses. The main, original campus is on Albany Avenue, next to USH. There are two other campuses in Hartford, on Wethersfield Avenue and Spring Street. Programming has also changed to include more resources for adults.
