Important UUA Bylaws Revision —

The Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) is proposing to change both the mission of the UUA and the purpose of our churches. These changes will affect all UU churches and Hartford is no exception. The linked article here is by Anne Scheneider, Ph.D, a retired professor from Arizona State University and long-time UU. Anne gives both sides – the viewpoint of those who support the changes and those who oppose them. It's a good place to start. If you want to dig deeper, go here or to the UUA website here.

The proposed revisions will make **major** changes to our Principles and Sources. Unitarian Universalism does not have a theology like mainstream religions, but we all honor the moral and ethical code outlined in our Principles and Sources (see below).

Unitarian Universalist Principles —

There are seven Principles which Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote:

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person
- Justice, equity and compassion in human relations
- · Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

Unitarian Universalist Sources —

Unitarian Universalism draws from many Sources:

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit
- Spiritual teachings of earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

Have We No Principles?

The Unitarian Universalist Association is proposing to change the bylaws. This proposal:

- Replaces the 7 Principles and 6 Sources of our Living Tradition with values and covenants that do not have the breadth and meaning of the Principles and Sources:
- Eliminates the commitment to individual freedom of belief; and
- Changes the purpose of the UUA. The current purpose of the UUA is to serve the needs of member congregations. Instead, the proposal would transform the UUA into a top-down political action organization.

These changes are sweeping and would transform Unitarian Universalism as we know it. The changes will be voted on at General Assembly in Pittsburgh this June. Please take the time to familiarize yourself with these issues at www.savethe7principles.org. This site includes:

- A <u>side-by-side markup of the changes</u> (just the facts, no opinions),
- A balanced <u>Pro/Con Review</u> that is a good introduction,
- A brief Summary Commentary on the proposal,
- A longer well written case for retaining the Principles, and
- A detailed line-by-line analysis of the proposal.

On **April 16**, our pulpit guest will be Wren Bellavance Grace, a representative from the New England Region, UUA. Plan to stay after the service for our traditional Soup Sunday. Wren will join us and give us a chance to ask questions. Please plan to be there.

one of the first agencies to provide care for neglected children. What began over 200 years ago as The female Beneficent Society to help children, grew over many iterations to its present form in 1993. The mission of The Village is "to build a community of strong healthy families to support and nurture children." The Village works in collaboration with local and state agencies and relies on supporters and donors. In response to growing needs, The Village now has three campuses. The main, original campus is on Albany Avenue, next to USH. There are two other campuses in Hartford, on Wethersfield Avenue and Spring Street. Programming has also changed to include more resources for adults.
