Have We No Principles? (Part 2)

Many of us have been Unitarian Universalists for decades. In all this time, we probably didn't pay much attention to our Unitarian Universalist Association in Boston. The UUA was there, in the background, to serve the needs of its member churches. But now is the time to pay attention to what is going on in Boston. The bylaws of the UUA are being drastically changed. This will change the fundamental nature of Unitarian Universalism as we know it.

The current proposal:

- Eliminates the 4th Principle: *a free and responsible search for truth and meaning.* This curtails our individual freedom of belief in favor of a set of beliefs to which we all will be expected to covenant.
- Alters the other 6 Principles, reducing them to *values and covenants*.

- Reduces the 6 Sources of our Living Tradition to a short paragraph of "inspirations."
- Changes the purpose of the UUA. The current purpose of the UUA is to serve the needs of member congregations. Instead, the proposal would transform the UUA into a top-down political action organization primarily focused on dismantling racism. These changes will be voted on at General Assembly in Pittsburgh this June. Please take the time to familiarize yourself with these issues at www.savethe7principles.org. This site includes:
- •A **side-by-side markup of the changes** (just the facts, no opinions),
- A balanced Pro/Con Review that is a good introduction,
- A brief **Summary Commentary** on the proposal,
- A longer well-written case for retaining the Principles, and
- A **detailed line-by-line analysis** of the proposal.
- •You can also go to <u>UUA.org</u> and search "bylaws changes." The UUA has given us until April 30 to suggest amendments to these changes. We are being allowed only to change wording, not to change the basis of the proposal. To weigh in with your word changes, go here: <u>link.</u>

If these proposed bylaws changes are approved, they still need final approval at GA in 2024.

On April 16, our pulpit guest will be wren Bellavance Grace, a representative from the New England Region, UUA. Plan to stay after the service for our traditional Soup Sunday. Wren will join us and give us a chance to ask questions.

Meet The Artist: Diane Cadrain

I have retired from my work as a lawyer and free-lance writer, but I've been sewing all my life, starting with hand embroidery as taught by my grandmother at our home in Hamden, Connecticut. The Hamden public school system taught me machine sewing, and with that skill, I

proceeded to construct my own clothes and costumes. As a law student at Georgetown University Law Center, I learned to knit, and later, in my early 30s, as a new mother, I began quilting.

The natural world inspires my work by offering constantly-refreshed images of arresting loveliness. Tolstoy said, "Love all creation...love every leaf." In that spirit, I attempt to create images that combine fragility with strength, the evanescent with the eternal. My work includes machine piecing and quilting, hand painting, felting, hand embroidery, and knitting.

My husband, Joe Rubin, is retired from the Connecticut Attorney General's office. We have three daughters: Julia, Leah, and Lucia, and one standard poodle.
