Celebration of Life and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Intersex, and Asexual+ Liberation Stained Glass Memorial Saturday, April 15, 1:00 p.m.

A Celebration of Life for Crispin Hollings will be held on April 15 at the USH. Crispin was a key leader in the LGBTQI+ civil rights movement in Connecticut and served two terms as Co-Director for the then Connecticut Coalition for Lesbian and Gay Civil Rights. His work contributed to the passage of Connecticut's first comprehensive civil rights law for the lesbian and gay community. He was a key player in Hartford's progressive activism.

Crispin passed away unexpectedly on November 10, 2022, in San Francisco where he had lived for many years. A memorial service has already been held at the San Francisco City Hall.

A Stained Glass Memorial (artist: Dennis Peabody), now resides over the window by the front entrance of USH. The stained glass has been donated by John Bonelli in loving memory of Victor D'Lugin, Crispin Hollings, Shawn Lang, and all those who came before and continue the struggle for freedom and love.

USH has been an ardent supporter of LGBTQI+ rights. We hope that, as a religious organization, hosting this memorial will inspire other institutions, both civic and spiritual, to embrace the cause. The memorial will provide a physical symbol for the struggles and challenges experienced by LGBTQI+ individuals. It will serve as a reminder about how individuals and communities can rise up and speak truth to ignorance and bias. The memorial will showcase a movement which, past and continuing currently, has organized and mobilized for equality, freedom, justice, and liberation.

Have We No Principles? A Call For Questions

On Sunday, April 16, wren Bellavance Grace will be our pulpit guest. She is currently serving as a UUA Congregational Consultant. She will join us in Fellowship Hall after the service for our monthly Soup Sunday. Wren has agreed to answer questions about the proposed changes to Article II of the bylaws.

Please forward your questions to Judy Robbins. To maximize our time with wren, Judy will relay your questions, consolidating those with similar content. Please put **Questions** in the subject line and send to judyrobb2@gmail.com.

The issue at stake is substantial. Article II is the section of the UUA Bylaws that contains the purpose of the UUA, our Seven Principles, and Six Sources.

The proposal:

- Changes the purpose of the UUA. The current purpose of the UUA is to serve the needs of member congregations. The proposed purpose of the UUA is to actively engage its members in the transformation of the world through liberating Love...to assist congregations in their vital ministries, support and train leaders both lay and professional, to foster lifelong faith formation, to heal historic injustices, and to advance our Unitarian Universalist values in the world.
- Alters the other 7 Principles reducing them to *values and covenants*.
- Reduces the 6 Sources to a short paragraph of "inspirations."
- Emphasizes covenants and accountability without clearly stating what this actually means.

The changes will be voted on at General Assembly in Pittsburgh this June. Please take the time to familiarize yourself with these issues at www.savethe7principles.org. You can also go to UUA.org and search "bylaws changes."

The UUA has given us until April 30 to suggest amendments to these changes. We are being allowed to change wording *only*, not to change the actual proposal. To weigh in with your word changes. Go here: <u>link</u>.

If these proposed Bylaws changes are approved, they still need final approval at GA in 2024.


