WHERE'S MY NAME TAG??!?

(Answer: Check at the Welcome Table.)

Elves have been at work; they have been moving things around, and objects may not be in their accustomed homes. Chancel Arts has its own room. Fellowship Hall has been scrubbed and classrooms have been reorganized.

The lobby is another focus. More than 300 name tags were in the racks, including tags for many one-time visitors. Members and friends may have had duplicate tags, and there's been a bit of culling.

There were 150+ opportunities for mistakes to occur in sorting all these, so if your tag is missing it is probably at the Welcome Table in the lobby. When you leave, just put it back in the main rack (alphabetical by first letter of your last name please). (UUs can be unconventional, but we still — pretty much — adhere to alphabetical order.)

The name tag rack may gravitate to different spots over the next few weeks as we experiment with various locations. Reducing congestion as people enter the sanctuary is the objective here.

Sewer Pump Replacement Complete Before 2024

As many of our faithful readers remember, we had a 'situation' last summer, where one of the pumps residing in a sewer pit, in a storage room on the west side of Fellowship Hall, failed. Alerted to this fact, we summoned Eastern Water Solutions, a company specializing in repairs of that sort required.

Because there are two pumps in such a pit, and their purpose is to periodically empty the pit of accumulated wastewater from the building, failure of one pump produces a rather urgent situation: if the second pump also failed, sewage would soon be flowing into places you would not wish to find it!

The contractor did a good job of extracting the dead pump from the pit. However, the pumps obtained for replacement purposes were constructed to run on three-phase voltage — different than what we happen to have in the building. We add, parenthetically here, the error was caused because a voltage label on the existing equipment was not accurate; thus, the presumed voltage was not actually in use.

Consequently, there was a delay while the single working pump continued its faithful pumping while new pumps were ordered for the actual voltage available. The pumps arrived, were installed, and tested. They worked well. Then, in the silence when they completed their cycle, the sewage in the pipes rising to street level could be heard sloshing back through the old check valve — the purpose of which is to prevent that exact reversal from happening.



So, next step: two new check valves were obtained and successfully installed and tested last Wednesday (11/15). To effect this, the pit was cleaned out, two new pumps were installed and made responsive to a new control panel, and the job is finished! It has been, it could be said, a long, strange trip, but the system should be good for many years, as was the old one.

(The picture above is of the finished project. Who knew of such things!)

In the photo, you can see two pipes arising from the pit. At the foot of each, a new pump awaits its summons to action. The two pipes attach to the new blue check valves, and then to manual gate valves. The gate valves can be closed manually during system repairs. The pipes converge from each pump and rise to the sewer main located in front of the building. The new control panel on the wall can summon help with a loud sound and flashing red light when necessary. The probability of a prolonged power outage coinciding with a full building (with lots of simultaneous flushing) is unlikely. (Should that occur, we might think about purchasing a sheaf of lottery tickets...)

And that, finally, is the rest of the story!
