

President's Message: Semi-Annual Meeting

Our semi-annual congregational meeting will be held this Sunday, February 18, following the worship service and a good helping of excellent soup. Normally this

meeting is purely informational – a chance to find out what the board of directors has been up to and to ask them questions.

BUT — this year something exciting is going to happen: the members of the congregation are going to be asked to vote on giving Reverend Bob Janis a 5-year contract! The seven months since Rev. Bob has been among us have been pretty awesome, and the atmosphere at USH has turned around 180°! Attendance has grown. Hopes have soared. And the smiling all around is infectious.

The board of directors voted unanimously at our January meeting to offer Rev. Bob a 5-year contract. But we all agree that the whole congregation should have a say in this. Some have asked, "Why 5 years? Why not a settled ministry?"

Valid questions, indeed. To begin with, the idea was originally suggested by Rev. Bob. His reasoning is sound. In 5 years, his youngest child will be graduating from high school. He is not sure how that will impact his life and ministry, and he didn't feel that in good faith he could commit to a longer timeline. Let's face it, who among us knows what our lives will be like in 5 years?

The other part of the equation is that the lines between a contract minister and a settled minister have become blurred over the last couple decades. An average settled UU minister now stays at a congregation for 7 years. Including this year, Rev. Bob will have been at USH for 6 years.

That does **not** mean that Rev. Bob has decided to leave at the end of his 5-year contract. It only means that he can't be sure beyond that

point. If we are really, really nice to him, we may be able to convince him to stay longer!

Bottom line is – **show up and vote on Sunday, either in person or on-line.** Let's show Rev. Bob just how much we want him to stick around. I know that, as board president, I should appear neutral in this matter. But I can't help it – I like the guy!

For those of you in the congregation who are not full members, and want your voices heard, I suggest you send Rev. Bob a note or email letting him know how you feel about the 5 year contract.

During the meeting, there will be opportunities for people to ask questions. It is your chance to grill or roast the board. There will also be updates on what the board has been working on – the usual droning of council reports.

I hope to see everyone here on Sunday!




Stan Sullivan – An eclectic singersongwriter and acoustic guitar instrumentalist, Stan Sullivan is an award-winning Hartford-based artist. Along with performing, Stan has won numerous awards in songwriting and guitar contests that span various categories such as Love, Religion/Spirit, Instrumental, Humorous, Political, and Modern Ballad. Contests range from Arizona's Southwest Regional Fingerstyle, to New Hampshire's Folk Guitar & Fiddle, to the Walnut Valley Songwriting Showcase in Kansas.

Mother Rose's Boutique, a sister project to Church Street Eats, collects donations of (mostly) used clothing. Currently, they're unable

to support the growing need for wearables as donations have become scarce. By working together, we can help them reopen their boutique.

Pick up a pack of new socks, undergarments, or toiletries to donate. **All** donations of clothing are welcome, but the need is much greater for men's clothing. All sizes are accepted, but generally Large and Extra Large are most helpful.

Free Zoom Discussion Series: 'The Sum of Us' Podcasts – Stories of Hope, Collaboration & Stronger Communities

Listen to the hopeful collaborations happening around this country in

Heather McGhee's podcasts *The Sum of Us*. She notes that Americans have been fed a "zero-sum story" that says progress for people of color will take away what white Americans already have. Facilitated Zoom discussions about each podcast will take place monthly from 7:00 – 8:30 p.m. Though the discussion series has started, **people are welcome to join the Zoom sessions at any point in the schedule. Podcast #4: Kansas City, Missouri: Flipping Burgers (40 minutes)

Terrence Wise was a Black man flipping burgers at a McDonald's in Kansas City, Missouri. Bridget Hughes was a white woman punching the clock at a local Burger King. After feeding hundreds of people a day at work, Terrence and Bridget were both struggling to feed their families at home. Neither saw a way to improve their lives until they teamed up to join the movement for a living wage. During this podcast, these improbable modern-day labor leaders share the story of their friendship and how they came to see racism as the common enemy in the battle against poverty in America.

They helped launch the Missouri Workers Center, a state-wide organization that organizes low-wage workers across racial and geographic dividing lines. Their stories show how even people whose jobs put them among the least respected in society can take on corporate greed and win.

"I came to realize through the Fight for \$15 Movement that we get more together than we do apart," said Terrence. "So nowadays when I go to work and I clock in, what I have that's greatly different from in the past is hope."


